





Gloucester Heritage Open Days Friday 9th to Sunday11th Sept 2022

This is the 50th year Jubilee of Gloucester Civic Trust. National HODs started in 1992 and we started here in 1994 making this our 28th year. HOD is often described as the showcase for the Civic Trust. After two years of reduced activities due to Covid restrictions we are aiming to get back up to speed again this year. We hope you will enjoy what we do have to offer.

A few important points to note:-

- We are part of the Gloucester History Festival but we have produced our own brochure and are making our own booking arrangements. You will find this brochure on the Civic Trust website www.gloucestercivictrust.org but there will also be paper copies available in key places around the City. We ask that if you have received this by email you will forward copies on to all interested family and friends.
- Although Covid restrictions have now been largely dropped we suggest that sensible precautions are taken by visitors to avoid infection.

Guided Walks

In 1903 Beatrix Potter published one of her most loved tales, The Tailor of Gloucester. It was inspired by a visit she made to the city. This guided walk takes in the places of Gloucester which are closely connected with Beatrix Potter. The walk lasts about 45 mins.

A chance to explore Britain's most complete Dominican Priory, owned by English Heritage and managed by Gloucester City. Most of the 13th century church remains, including a rare scissorbraced roof. The walk lasts about 1 hour.

A history of the area surrounding the cathedral from the earliest Minster church up to the most recent developments. The walk lasts about 1 hour.

There is an old saying 'As sure as God's in Gloucester'. Both Christianity and Gloucester have 2,000 years of history. This walk traces Gloucester's rich Christian heritage over those years as reflected in its people, places and events. The walk lasts about 1½ hours.

Eastgate Chamber

Meet at Boots in Eastgate Street

This underground chamber on Eastgate Street reveals the remains of the Roman city defences and the East Gate dating back to about AD 68 when Gloucester was founded. This lasts about 45 mins.

Meet at Denmark Road entrance. Road parking is available nearby.

Take a guided tour of these fine gardens which have many fine trees and are home to three monuments of historical significance: Scriven's Conduit, the King's Board and the chancel of the 12th century leper chapel of St Mary Magdalene. The walk covers some uneven and quite steep ground in places so sensible footwear is required. The walk lasts about 1 hour.

Meet at Heritage Hub, Gloucestershire Archives, Alvin Street

Trace the history of the area from Roman times to present day. The walk starts from the Heritage Hub in Alvin Street where some parking is available (£3 per day). Hillfield Gardens are included so wear comfortable walking shoes. The walk lasts about 2 hours.



Llanthony Secunda Priory

This guided walk explores the priory which was founded in 1136, which by the end of the 15th century, was the richest Augustinian house in England entertaining the court of Henry VII in 1500 and 1501. The walk lasts about 1 hour.

Discover the Abbey and Priories of Gloucester and learn how the Monks, Canons and Friars lived and worked. The route includes some uneven ground. Sensible footwear required. The walk lasts about 1 hour.

This walk looks at both sides of the story, slavery and abolition. The walk is all on hard surfaces but includes a couple of ramps and bridges. The walk lasts about 11/4 hours.

Start at Blackfriars, walk through the docks to Llanthony Bridge then via Park Road to Barton Gates and via Bruton way to the railway station looking at what remains on site and how it fits into the story. The walk lasts about 1½ hours and ends at Gloucester Railway Station.

Tash has rapidly gained a reputation for being the lady who turns streets into rainbows and transforming parts of the city that have fallen into disrepair. This feel good tour is a



must for people of all ages and anyone who has a passion for colour and creativity. The walk lasts about 1½ hours.

Meet at St Michael's Tower, The Cross

Follow in the footsteps of a country rector around Gloucester in the 19th Century as he visits the opening of the docks and the music meeting. Witts, a magistrate and a county administrator, views the city with a keen eye. Walk lasts about 11/4 hours.

This tour tells of Richard III's important 3 day visit to Gloucester in 1483, as part of his Royal Progress and explains the granting of the significant Charter to the city. You will hear how he spent his time here and be shown some of the buildings he would have seen. The walk lasts about 1hour.

Robert Raikes

This walk tells the story of Robert Raikes, newspaper publisher, prison reformer and promoter of the Sunday School movement and shows some of the buildings in Gloucester connected with him. The guided walk starts in the garden of the Robert Raikes House where Robert's wife used to serve plum cake



to the Sunday School children in the 18th century. The walk lasts about 1 hour.

Royal Gloucester

For over 1100 years Gloucester's history has been shaped in no small part by the interest, patronage and occasional displeasure of the reigning monarch. Down the centuries, kings and queens of England have come to Gloucester to hold parliament, equip armies, grant charters, go hunting, be crowned, and



be buried. This tour will take a look at some of buildings and places in Gloucester at the heart of this extraordinary royal history and reveal some of the fascinating stories connected with them. The walk lasts about 1½ hours.

Saxon Gloucester

Discover the traces of Gloucester's Saxon history. Hear the story of Aethelflaed, Lady of the Mercians who died in 918 and was buried in Gloucester, and learn about the role she played in shaping the city as we know it. The walk lasts about 11/4 hours.

Siege of Gloucester

Meet at St Michael's Tower, The Cross

This guided walk visits some of the places of interest connected with the siege of Gloucester which took place during the English Civil War. The siege was arguably Gloucester's finest hour when the small garrison of parliamentarians held out against the might of the Royal Army led by the King himself. The walk lasts about $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours.

Explore the history of Gloucester through the medium of public statues. Learn about the people and events that made Gloucester the city it is today. The walk lasts about 1½ hours.

A walk along the Twyver where it forms the boundary between Abbeydale and Abbeymead to see the sites of some of the now dismantled mills, the likely places where the Romans started the canal into the city and the Royalists cut off the water supply during the Siege of Gloucester. Stout shoes required.

The walk takes about 2 hours.

Westgate Street and Cathedral Quarter Heritage Walk

One of four original Roman routes, Westgate is one of the oldest and best preserved areas of Gloucester and the main commercial route linking the Cathedral to the rest of the city. See its array of stunning historic buildings includes the 15th Century timber framed Fleece Inn, Judge's Lodgings and The Folk and find out how the Heritage Action Zone, with the



award of nearly £2m, is helping to regenerate and revitalise the buildings and life in this area. The walk lasts about 1½ hours and ends at The Folk.

Popular with his patients but viewed with suspicion by the medical profession which led to his trial and acquittal for the murder of a child under his care. The talk will be given by Paul Drinkwater.

Pat Bosley will cover an interesting part of Gloucester's history with the start of the Spa Company at Eagle Hall in the 1740's, it's move to Spa Road and it's closure in 1869.

Bearland House

Bearland House is an impressive 18th century building with an ornamental façade, forecourt, and fine wrought iron railings and gates. The interior boasts a carved wooden staircase and decorated ceilings. It was purchased by a high county Sheriff in 1764, and the ghost of his daughter is said to appear at the staircase window.

Brockworth Court was initially the residence for the Priors of Llanthony Priory. Following the dissolution of 1540 Henry VIII granted it to the Guise family until the late 19th Century. It is now owned by the Wiltshires, the present generation of whom have lovingly restored the property and gardens.

Gloucester Cathedral

Formerly the Benedictine Abbey of St Peter, founded in the 11th century, the Cathedral features Norman pillars in the nave, the elaborate tomb of Edward II, exquisite 14th century fan vaulting, the 15th century tower and the magnificent Great East Window.

Entry to the Cathedral is by voluntary donation and on Heritage Open Days we

are delighted to offer additional free events and tours for visitors.

ACCESS STATEMENT:

There is level access to the main Cathedral and Stonemasons' Workshop. The Parliament Rooms, Tribune Gallery, Crypt, Library and Tower are accessed fully and partially by stairs..

Parliament Rooms

Visit three historic rooms in Church House, the former Abbots' lodgings which are the site of Richard 11's parliament in 1378 and are the place where Henry VIII and Anne Boleyn stayed in their royal progress of 1535.

Gloucester is one of only a few that still has its own onsite workshop. Enjoy carving

Medieval Library Open Doors (book through Cathedral) Fri 9th Sept

Entry every 15 mins between 10.30 – 16.30 (last entry at 16.00) Located up a winding spiral staircase the 15th Century library houses the Cathedral's collection of books and manuscripts dating back to the 11th Century. Explore this hidden historic gem under your own steam on a self guided visit.

Access is via 38 steps.

Guided Highlights Tours (book through Cathedral) Sat 10th Sept 10.30, 1100, 1200, 1330pm and 1400 Tours last for 1 hour

Find out about the fascinating world of the monks who used to live here, the tomb of the murdered king Edward 11, hear about the stunning stained glass and see where Harry Potter was filmed.

Guided Tower Tours Sat 10th Sept 1330 and 1430 Tours last for one hour.

Climb to the top of the tower and enjoy breath-taking views 40 miles across Gloucestershire. Get behind the scenes access the ancient roof spaces and see the largest medieval bell in Britain that is still in use. Suitable for all ages over 6 years. Access is via 269 steps (mainly enclosed spiral staircase)

Opened in 1792 as a model prison and closed in 2013. There is normally a charge for guided tours but for Heritage Open Days access is free for a 'taster' view of the prison. Access to A - B wings and the Chapel.



Llanthony Secunda Priory

Priory Junction, Gloucester GL2 5FA

Founded in 1136, the history of this former Augustinian priory is told throughout 5 acres of grounds. In the medieval period, the scholars of Llanthony Secunda were responsible for the creation of a very special library that is still considered one of the richest and best-documented medieval English book collections in the country. This remarkable library is no longer in Gloucester but is scattered across the world. A new documentary film launching this weekend traces the stories the books tell, how they were created and how they survived almost certain destruction. Come along to Llanthony Secunda Priory on Saturday and Sunday to find out more about how you can watch the film, and to explore how medieval manuscripts were created.

Probably built in the second half of the 18th century this building has been occupied by a Perfumer, a Cider merchant and Brewer and been used as a bonded warehouse and dance hall. Presently occupied by the Gloucester Freemasons as their Masonic Lodge.

Believed to be Britain's finest example of a timber framed town house. Built in 1560, it was once the hall of the Grocers' Guild, the mansion house of a Mayor of Gloucester and, in the 19th century, a lodging for assize judges. Meet outside on Westgate Street. Tours last about an hour.

Old Bishop's Palace

Tours to last 20 minutes on the hour and half hour. Last tour at 1.00pm Pitt Street

The 19th century residence of the Bishops of Gloucester built on the site of the medieval abbot's lodging. Now used by the King's School. Short guided tours of the palace, gardens, yard, Bishop's Private Chapel and Abbot's Dining Hall.

Originally built in 1880 as the Friends Sherbourne Street Mission Room. It later became a Christadelphian Hall but closed in 2012. It is now a popular cinema renovated in an Edwardian style with Art Deco additions.



The original dwelling on this site was built by William Myparty, a burgess of Gloucester, in the late 12th Century when the bridge over the Severn was being constructed. It housed not only the bridge workers but also sick men and women under the care of a priest. It continued as a hospital for the sick who were looked after by Augustinian priests and lay people who were also responsible for the maintenance of the bridge. It became the wealthiest of the three ancient Gloucester hospitals. Rebuilt in the 18th Century it continued as an Almshouse and was restored in the early 1980's for use as a shopping and craft centre. The old alms houses are now used as a suite of modern offices.

Hospital), and the Rudhall family, the world- famous bell founders whose bells can be found in Cathedrals and Churches throughout the world. The East Window was installed in 1880 to commemorate the centenary of the Sunday School Movement.

The Chapel was part of a monastic institution set up outside the medieval city boundary for the benefit of those suffering from the then incurable disease of leprosy. This Grade II listed timber framed inn was built in the early 16th century. Although first recorded as an inn in 1806, it is believed to have been an inn for at least a century before. As its name suggests, it was a coaching inn.

Comfy Pew 11 College Street

The Comfy Pew is in a Grade II listed row of timber-framed buildings which date back to the 15th century though with later alterations, situated next to the main entrance gates to Gloucester Cathedral. It is now a friendly, family-run licensed coffee-shop and restaurant.



Cross Keys

Cross Keys Lane

This Grade II listed early 16th century timber-framed building was originally three cottages. Although records showing it in use as a pub date back only to 1720, its name is a symbol of St Peter and suggests it was originally supplied with beer from the nearby St Peter's Abbey, which became Gloucester Cathedral in 1541.

The Dick Whittington 100 Westgate Street

100 Westgate Street

A superb 15th century building known as St Nicholas House, which was once a town house of the Whittington family. It retains many original features, and has a splendid Georgian façade. There are wall decorations on the first floor reputed to have been done for the visit of Elizabeth I in 1574.

Kimberley Warehouse, The Docks

This inn is housed in the Kimberley Warehouse which was built in 1846 for the corn trade, along with its neighbours, the Herbert and Phillpotts warehouses. It is named after the well-known nursery rhyme.

The Fountain Inn

53 Westgate Street

The Fountain Inn occupies one of the oldest brewing sites in the city. It was once owned by Peter Poitevin who crowned Henry III in St Peter's Abbey in 1216. The story in the entrance tells how King William showed his contempt for the Jacobites by riding his horse up the steps in the courtyard.

The Imperial

59 Northgate Street

The current building dates from 1898 and has an elaborately moulded glazed tile exterior. It replaced a pub which appears in records from 1722 but the original building was 1556.

The New Inn

16 Northgate Street

The New Inn is described as the finest example of a medieval galleried inn to be seen in Britain today. It was built between 1430 and 1450 by St Peter's Abbey. Much of the original structure still remains.

Northend Vaults

Northgate Street

This Grade II listed building dates back to the early 17th century when it was a merchant's house. It was re-fronted in the 18th century, but behind is the original timber framed building. It has been a pub since 1869.

The Old Bell Inn

9a Southgate Street

A timber-framed building built for Thomas Yate apothecary and Mayor of Gloucester around 1650. It has a magnificent Jacobean timbered façade dating from around 1665. The main feature is the ornate stone overmantel commemorating Yate's marriage. The building has had many uses over the years including as the city tea warehouse and today is a beautiful bar and restaurant

The Old Crown

81-83 Westgate Street

A Crown Inn was first recorded nearby in 1460. In 1643, at the time of the English Civil War the military governor of Gloucester, Colonel Massey, aged 23, lodged here. during the siege of Gloucester when the inn was fired on by Royalist troops based at Llanthony Secunda Priory.

The building continued to be used as an inn until 1760. Restored, it was reopened as a public house in 1990

The Pelican

4 St Mary's Street

The pub first appears in licensing records in 1679 and claims to be constructed using timbers from Sir Francis Drake's ship the Golden Hind, which was originally called The Pelican.

Portivo Lounge

Gloucester Quays

A beautiful red brick structure, it was built in 1894 as a corn mill in the prosperous Gloucester Docks. Restored in 2010 as part of the Gloucester Quays redevelopment, it sits proudly on the main entrance.

Robert Raikes's House

71-73 Southgate Street

A magnificent timber-framed merchant's house dating from 1560, which has been wonderfully restored at great expense by Samuel Smiths the Brewers. Robert Raikes, the campaigner for prison reform and promoter of the Sunday School movement, moved into the building in 1772. A tour about Robert Raikes starts from the garden of the pub.

The Sword Inn

Westgate Street

This bar is sited in two Elizabethan houses. One has a Georgian frontage, and used to be the premises of John Pritchard, the original Tailor of Gloucester and inspiration for Beatrix Potter's book.

The Tall Ship

134 Southgate Street

Located at the entrance to the Docks, this Grade II listed building was built specifically as a pub around 1870. Specialises in sea food.

The Whitesmiths Arms

81 Southgate Street

Located opposite the entrance to the Docks, this was a beer house by 1871, though part of the building dates from the 15th century. The original roof beams can be seen in the small room to the right of the bar.

Ye Olde Fish and Chip Shoppe

A fine example of an Elizabethan building.
